

Four County Community Foundation's 2022 Scholarships Make a **Huge Impact!**

The scholarship total awarded by Four County Community Foundation for 2022 was the largest amount awarded in their 35 year history. Out of the over 600 applications from students in the communities of Almont, Armada, Capac, Dryden, Imlay City, Memphis, Richmond, Romeo and Utica, scholarships were awarded to a total of 128 students. Several of these students received more than one bringing the grand total to 179 scholarships totaling \$334,800.

Four County Community Foundation Celebrates 35 Years!

From an initial endowment of \$2.5 million, from the sale of the Community Hospital by its board of directors in the late 1980's, to 35 years later, Four County Community Foundation has been able to award more than \$10.4 million in scholarships and grants for community projects through more than 144 funds in the four counties it serves. The foundation creates endowments, which are prudently invested, and the funds use the endowments' income to meet their missions. According to several past and present board members, the foundation, which "is a testimony to the quality of all the succeeding Boards," has grown as a result of

"good leadership and careful investing" and has continually been able to meet their mission of "connecting local donors to local causes."

Carrying on a tradition of community members banding together to help each other, "one of the best things about the foundation is that it allows people to have a local and lasting impact with their charitable dollars."

2022 GRANT AWARDS

Four County Community Foundation funded projects addressing food security, education, health, community safety, mental health, child advocacy, reading, and the arts. Below are just a few examples of how the grants have benefited the local population. To date in 2022, the Foundation has awarded 35 grants totaling \$149,000.

Oxford Township Fire Department: Safety Begins at Home

Oxford Township received \$10,000 in grant funding for the Oxford Fire Department's "Safety Begins at Home" program to help purchase smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. These alarms will be installed, free-of-charge, for low-income individuals, senior citizens and those with physical or developmental disabilities.

Foundation Directory Online at Oxford Public Library

The lion's share of a \$5,000 grant was awarded to the Oxford Public Library which is now one of only seven libraries in Michigan with a

subscription to Foundation Directory Online (FDO), a service that gives non-profit groups access to nearly 250,000 grant-making foundations and agencies. Any non-profit within Four County Community Foundation's service area is able to come to the library and use this directory. The database is fairly simple to navigate. Health and Wellness

4CCF supported a number of wellness projects including:

- Senior Bingo-cize, Healthy MI Badge Camp, Teen Mental Health First-Aid Training and the ADA's Camp Midicha in Michigan where area youth with diabetes receive health education as well as enjoy summer camp activities.
- Susie Q's Kids received funds from the foundation's Healthy Senior-Healthy Youth Fund (HSHY) and Healthy Futures Fund which will assist them in providing comfort bags to children and teens in foster care, shelters and hospitals, and those grieving.

Education-based Awards

Nearly \$30,000 was awarded to local school districts for school and classroom projects. Some of these awards were given through a brand new grant called the 2021-2022 Grant Tank, modeled after the television show titled Shark Tank. Awards are

determined by the 4CCF W.K. Kellogg-Youth Advisory Committee (YAC) and the teachers are encouraged to include the students in the grant process from start to finish, including creating a video to be submitted along with the written application.

- Capac FFA received one of three YAC Grant Tank awards which will allow them to purchase their own livestock trailer to transport animals.
- The second YAC Grant Tank award was given to Imlay City High School. These funds will allow the launch of an after-school Music Club helping students learn songwriting, practice and performance and instrument repair.

• Imlay City Middle School received a 21st Century Education grant for "One Book, One School," a school-wide reading event where students, families, and school staff all read the same book!

- Hamilton-Parsons Elementary in Romeo also received funds, for classroom library support, through the 21st Century Education fund.
- Weston Elementary will have access to STEM-based materials to use in the classroom thanks to funds from the third YAC Grant Tank award.

- Capac Elementary students can now access books with the push of a button, a vending machine button, that will dispense the book of their choice. Financial support was provided by the Foundation to help purchase the book vending machine and 4CCF Executive Director Kathy Dickens was on hand for the ribbon cutting ceremony.
- Almont Middle School geography teacher, Lori Arnissi's students reached out to 4CCF for the funds to pay for new, up-todate globes and maps of various kinds. To meet the application criteria, the students created short, comical videos where they played the parts of the teacher and students to demonstrate the need for updated materials.

- The Discovery Center of Macomb and Armada Area Schools received grant funding through the Four County Community Fund and Shelby Community Fund.

A Feeding Families Forever Award of \$10,000 went to St. Mary Mystical Rose to assist with enlarging their food pantry space to better serve the expanding needs in the Armada area. The Stone Soup Food Pantry in Lapeer also received funding to expand and improve efficiency.

Students Get Immersed in Van Gogh

Almont High School was recently able to take 50 students and staff members to the Immersive Van Gogh exhibit through grant funding from Four County Community Foundation. This funding, initiated through 4CCF's Youth Advisory Council, afforded the students a chance to gain a greater appreciation and love for the arts. In order to win the grant money, those applying were asked to identify a problem or need and then propose a solution, budget and short video pitch for their idea. "I hope this experience serves to inspire, build creativity and allows students to dream and think big," said Lisa Wright, Almont High School art teacher.

4CCF PROJECTS

Along with grant funding initiatives that enhance communities and the lives of those that live within them, Four County Community Foundation is involved in several new and ongoing projects.

4CCF Addressing Community Need for Senior Public Transportation in Lapeer County

Formation of the Lapeer County Transportation Coalition

Always seeking to fulfill community needs in innovative ways, 4CCF applied for and was awarded a grant from the Michigan Health Endowment Fund to improve health outcomes of the senior citizens in Lapeer County, specifically the eastern rural portion. A general community survey conducted by 4CCF in 2019 identified several areas of need, one of which was public transportation. This brought about the formation of the Lapeer County Transportation Coalition which is working together to "Enhance quality of life in Lapeer County through accessible, safe and reliable and sustainable transportation." The coalition is

comprised of Community Stakeholders with broad professional backgrounds in healthcare, local governments, senior services, emergency services, transportation and other expertise. The coalition's purpose is to create a plan with diverse transportation options that meet the needs in the under served areas of Lapeer County. As part of this endeavor, the coalition partnered with the Greater Lapeer Transportation Authority (GLTA) and contracted with consultants from RLS & Associates, Inc. and Easter Seals Project Action Consulting to conduct a transportation needs assessment that would assist community leaders with identifying the transportation issues that are barriers to healthy outcomes for seniors. Through cooperation with the GLTA and National Center for Mobility Management (NCMM), which has successfully worked with three separate transportation coalitions around the U.S., RLS was able to conduct peer research that explored ways other rural communities have succeeded in coalition-building and launching innovative transportation services and pinpoint specific areas of need within Lapeer County. The informational report put together by RLS will inform efforts to plan and fund a pilot transportation project that will guide future initiatives to expand public transportation service to these unserved areas. Statistics from Mental Health America's 2022 report shows that in 2019, just prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, 19.86% of adults experienced a mental illness, the equivalent of nearly 50 million Americans. The report also notes a growing percentage of youth in the U.S., 15.08%, have also experienced a major depressive episode in the past year, a 1.24% increase over the prior year.





4CCF Addressing Affordable Housing in Partnership with MSHDA

Building Michigan Together Plan

Another new enterprise, part of the Building Michigan Together Plan, has come about with a grant from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority's (MSHDA) MOD program. The foundation received \$200,000 in a repayable loan to create a modular build/modified technology home. These homes are built efficiently in sections in a climate-controlled home building facility, then transported to the home site. Modular housing typically offers a 30 to 50 percent shorter construction schedule, is less impacted by weather delays and the difficulty of finding skilled laborers, reduces the build timeline and allows for a more affordable home that families can move into immediately. It is hoped that these grants, seven in all across the state, will increase the incentive for the construction of affordable housing, empowering workers and have a positive effect on local economies.
