Andy Beam Memorial Scholarship (HS)

Capac and Lapeer HS seniors pursuing a degree which will benefit youth including **education**, **social** work, **counseling**, **law**, **law enforcement**, etc. **Award amount**: \$500 - \$1000

Floyd W. West Memorial Scholarship (HS)

Lapeer County Education & Technical Center Seniors, with a GPA of 1.75 or greater, pursuing a degree from a **vocational, technical, or skilled trades program**. **Award amount:** \$500 - \$1000

Michigan Professional Insurance Agents Scholarship (MIPIA) (HS and PHS)

Seniors and recent graduates throughout the State of Michigan who are planning to major in **Insurance/Risk Management**. Students are eligible to receive up to four awards.

Award amount: \$1000 - \$2000

Attention early/middle college, and dual enrollment students: DO NOT apply for Four County Community Foundation scholarships until the year you require tuition payments.

To apply:

After December 1, visit www.4ccf.org/scholarships/apply and set up an account. Complete instructions for using the online platform are available on the scholarship page. If you experience any problems, send an email to mbrown@4ccf.org or call (810) 798-0909.

- FIRST VISIT: Click on "Create New Account." Please use a <u>permanent email address</u> to create your logon credentials. A tutorial with step-by-step instructions on how to create an account and apply can be found on the portal's home page.
- SUBSEQUENT VISITS: After the initial registration, you will sign in with your email and password.

NOTE: All communications will be sent to the email address that you provide when you register your account. **Use a permanent email address** that you check regularly, not your high school email address. All follow-up documents will be sent to your registered email account.

Essay Response: All 4CCF scholarship applications require students to share their story in a narrative form using complete sentences and paragraphs. Your essay responses enable review committees to learn more about you. Sharing details about yourself provides the committee with a sense of who you are, how you spend your time, what your circumstances are like, and how attending a college or trade school supports your life goals. Start thinking and writing about the following:

• Majors: Be prepared to explain why you're pursuing a particular major or course of study.

- Activities and Achievements: Detail your involvement in academic groups, extracurricular clubs, music, athletics and include information about leadership roles you've held and awards you've received.
- **Community Involvement**: Describe the ways in which you interact and impact your community through community service and volunteerism either individually or as a member of a group.
- **Special Concerns**: You have an opportunity to explain any difficult circumstances in your life, such as financial hardship, learning challenges, family issues, health concerns, obstacles and adversity.
- Goals and Future Plans: List the ways a scholarship award will help you achieve your goals.

Other information you'll need when applying

- Academic Information: Your cumulative GPA, an unofficial transcript, your ACT/SAT scores if you took either test
- Financial Information: FAFSA Student Aid Index (SAI) report or a document stating why you did not complete a FAFSA form; the number of other scholarships you've applied for; the total value of other scholarships you have already received
